# A BILL

- To direct the Secretary of Health and Human Services to develop a national strategic action plan to assist health professionals in preparing for and responding to the public health effects of climate change, and for other purposes.
  - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
  - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

## **3** SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Climate Change Health
- 5 Protection and Promotion Act".

# SEC. 2. SENSE OF CONGRESS ON PUBLIC HEALTH AND CLI MATE CHANGE.

3 It is the sense of Congress that the Federal Govern-4 ment, in cooperation with international, State, tribal, and 5 local governments, concerned public and private organiza-6 tions, and citizens, should use all practicable means and 7 measures—

8 (1) to assist the efforts of public health and 9 health care professionals, first responders, States, 10 tribes, municipalities, and local communities to in-11 corporate measures to prepare health systems to re-12 spond to the impacts of climate change;

13 (2) to ensure—

14 (A) that the Nation's health professionals
15 have sufficient information to prepare for and
16 respond to the adverse health impacts of cli17 mate change;

- 18 (B) the utility and value of scientific re19 search in advancing understanding of—
- 20 (i) the health impacts of climate21 change; and

22 (ii) strategies to prepare for and re23 spond to the health impacts of climate
24 change;

25 (C) the identification of communities vul-26 nerable to the health effects of climate change

1	and the development of strategic response plans
2	to be carried out by health professionals for
3	those communities;
4	(D) the improvement of health status and
5	health equity through efforts to prepare for and
6	respond to climate change; and
7	(E) the inclusion of health policy in the de-
8	velopment of climate change responses;
9	(3) to encourage further research, interdiscipli-
10	nary partnership, and collaboration among stake-
11	holders in order to—
12	(A) understand and monitor the health im-
13	pacts of climate change; and
14	(B) improve public health knowledge and
15	response strategies to climate change;
16	(4) to enhance preparedness activities, and pub-
17	lic health infrastructure, relating to climate change
18	and health;
19	(5) to encourage each and every American to
20	learn about the impacts of climate change on health;
21	and
22	(6) to assist the efforts of developing nations to
23	incorporate measures to prepare health systems to
24	respond to the impacts of climate change.

## 1 SEC. 3. RELATIONSHIP TO OTHER LAWS.

Nothing in this Act limits the authority provided to or responsibility conferred on any Federal department or agency by any provision of any law (including regulations) or authorizes any violation of any provision of any law (including regulations), including any health, energy, environmental, transportation, or any other law or regulation. SEC. 4. NATIONAL STRATEGIC ACTION PLAN.

9 (a) REQUIREMENT.—

10 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary, not later 11 than 2 years after the date of enactment of this Act, 12 on the basis of the best available science, and in con-13 sultation pursuant to paragraph (2), shall publish a 14 strategic action plan to assist health professionals in 15 preparing for and responding to the impacts of cli-16 mate change on public health in the United States 17 and other nations, particularly developing nations.

18 (2) CONSULTATION.—In developing or making
19 any revision to the national strategic action plan, the
20 Secretary shall—

(A) consult with the Director of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the
Administrator of the Environmental Protection
Agency, the Director of the National Institutes
of Health, the Secretary of Energy, other appropriate Federal agencies, Indian tribes, State

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1	and local governments, public health organiza-
2	tions, and scientists, and other interested stake-
3	holders; and
4	(B) provide opportunity for public input.
5	(b) CONTENTS.—
6	(1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary, acting
7	through the Director of the Centers for Disease
8	Control and Prevention, shall assist health profes-
9	sionals in preparing for and responding effectively
10	and efficiently to the health effects of climate change
11	through measures including—
12	(A) developing, improving, integrating, and
13	maintaining domestic and international disease
14	surveillance systems and monitoring capacity to
15	respond to health-related effects of climate
16	change, including on topics addressing—
17	(i) water, food, and vector-borne infec-
18	tious diseases and climate change;
19	(ii) pulmonary effects, including re-
20	sponses to aeroallergens;
21	(iii) cardiovascular effects, including
22	impacts of temperature extremes;
23	(iv) air pollution health effects, includ-
24	ing heightened sensitivity to air pollution;
25	(v) hazardous algal blooms;

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1	(vi) mental and behavioral health im-
2	pacts of climate change;
3	(vii) the health of refugees, displaced
4	persons, and vulnerable communities;
5	(viii) the implications for communities
6	vulnerable to health effects of climate
7	change, as well as strategies for responding
8	to climate change within these commu-
9	nities; and
10	(ix) local and community-based health
11	interventions for climate-related health im-
12	pacts;
13	(B) creating tools for predicting and moni-
14	toring the public health effects of climate
15	change on the international, national, regional,
16	State, and local levels, and providing technical
17	support to assist in their implementation;
18	(C) developing public health communica-
19	tions strategies and interventions for extreme
20	weather events and disaster response situations;
21	(D) identifying and prioritizing commu-
22	nities and populations vulnerable to the health
23	effects of climate change, and determining ac-
24	tions and communication strategies that should
25	be taken to inform and protect these commu-

1	nities and populations from the health effects of
2	climate change;
3	(E) developing health communication, pub-
4	lic education, and outreach programs aimed at
5	public health and health care professionals, and
6	the general public, to promote preparedness and
7	response strategies relating to climate change
8	and public health, including the identification of
9	greenhouse gas reduction behaviors that are
10	health-promoting;
11	(F) developing academic and regional cen-
12	ters of excellence devoted to—
13	(i) researching relationships between
14	climate change and health;
15	(ii) expanding and training the public
16	health workforce to strengthen the capacity
17	of such workforce to respond to and pre-
18	pare for the health effects of climate
19	change;
20	(iii) creating and supporting academic
21	fellowships focusing on the health effects
22	of climate change; and
23	(iv) training senior health ministry of-
24	ficials from developing nations to strength-
25	en the capacity of such nations to—

1	(I) prepare for and respond to
2	the health effects of climate change;
3	and
4	(II) build an international net-
5	work of public health professionals
6	with the necessary climate change
7	knowledge base;
8	(G) using techniques, including health im-
9	pact assessments, to assess various climate
10	change public health preparedness and response
11	strategies on international, national, State, re-
12	gional, tribal, and local levels, and make rec-
13	ommendations as to the strategies that best
14	protect the public health;
15	(H)(i) assisting in the development, imple-
16	mentation, and support of State, regional, trib-
17	al, and local preparedness, communication, and
18	response plans (including with respect to the
19	health departments of such entities) to antici-
20	pate and reduce the health threats of climate
21	change; and
22	(ii) acting through the Director of the Cen-
23	ters for Disease Control and Prevention or an
24	appropriate Federal agency, pursuing collabo-

native offerts to develop integrate and imple
rative efforts to develop, integrate, and imple-
ment such plans;
(I) acting through the Director of the Cen-
ters for Disease Control and Prevention or an
appropriate Federal agency, creating a program
to advance research as it relates to the effects
of climate change on public health across Fed-
eral agencies, including research to—
(i) identify and assess climate change
health effects preparedness and response
strategies;
(ii) prioritize critical public health in-
frastructure projects related to potential
climate change impacts that affect public
health; and
(iii) coordinate preparedness for cli-
mate change health impacts, including the
development of modeling and forecasting
tools;
(J) providing technical assistance for the
development, implementation, and support of
preparedness and response plans to anticipate
and reduce the health threats of climate change
in developing nations; and

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1 (K) carrying out other activities deter-2 mined appropriate by the Secretary to plan for 3 and respond to the impacts of climate change 4 on public health. 5 (c) REVISION.—The Secretary shall revise the national strategic action plan not later than July 1, 2017, 6 7 and every 4 years thereafter, to reflect new information 8 collected pursuant to implementation of the national stra-9 tegic action plan and otherwise, including information 10 on— 11 (1) the status of critical environmental health 12 parameters and related human health impacts; 13 (2) the impacts of climate change on public 14 health; and 15 (3) advances in the development of strategies 16 for preparing for and responding to the impacts of 17 climate change on public health. 18 (d) IMPLEMENTATION.— 19 (1)IMPLEMENTATION THROUGH HHS.—The 20 Secretary shall exercise the Secretary's authority 21 under this Act and other Federal statutes to achieve 22 the goals and measures of the national strategic ac-23 tion plan. 24 (2) OTHER PUBLIC HEALTH PROGRAMS AND 25 INITIATIVES.—The Secretary and Federal officials of

1	other relevant Federal agencies shall administer
2	public health programs and initiatives authorized by
3	statutes other than this Act, subject to the require-
4	ments of such statutes, in a manner designed to
5	achieve the goals of the national strategic action
6	plan.
7	(3) CDC.—In furtherance of the national stra-
8	tegic action plan, the Director of the Centers for
9	Disease Control and Prevention shall—
10	(A) conduct scientific research to assist
11	health professionals in preparing for and re-
12	sponding to the impacts of climate change on
13	public health;
14	(B) provide funding for—
15	(i) research on the health effects of
16	climate change; and
17	(ii) preparedness planning on the
18	international, national, State, regional, and
19	local levels to respond to or reduce the bur-
20	den of health effects of climate change;
21	and
22	(C) carry out other activities determined
23	appropriate by the Director to prepare for and
24	respond to the impacts of climate change on
25	public health.

#### 1 SEC. 5. ADVISORY BOARD.

2 (a) ESTABLISHMENT.—The Secretary shall establish
3 a permanent science advisory board comprised of not less
4 than 10 and not more than 20 members.

5 (b) APPOINTMENT OF MEMBERS.—The Secretary
6 shall appoint the members of the science advisory board
7 from among individuals who—

8 (1) are recommended by the President of the9 National Academy of Sciences; and

10 (2) have expertise in public health and human
11 services, climate change, and other relevant dis12 ciplines.

13 (c) FUNCTIONS.—The science advisory board shall—

(1) provide scientific and technical advice and
recommendations to the Secretary on the domestic
and international impacts of climate change on public health, populations and regions particularly vulnerable to the effects of climate change, and strategies and mechanisms to prepare for and respond to
the impacts of climate change on public health; and

(2) advise the Secretary regarding the best
science available for purposes of issuing the national
strategic action plan.

#### 24 SEC. 6. REPORTS.

25 (a) NEEDS ASSESSMENT.—

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1	(1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall seek to
2	enter into, by not later than 6 months after the date
3	of enactment of this Act, an agreement with the Na-
4	tional Research Council and the Institute of Medi-
5	cine to complete a report that—
6	(A) assesses the needs for health profes-
7	sionals to prepare for and respond to climate
8	change impacts on public health; and
9	(B) recommends programs to meet those
10	needs.
11	(2) SUBMISSION.—The agreement under para-
12	graph (1) shall require the completed report to be
13	submitted to Congress and the Secretary and made
14	publicly available not later than 1 year after the
15	date of the agreement.
16	(b) CLIMATE CHANGE HEALTH PROTECTION AND
17	PROMOTION REPORTS.—
18	(1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall offer to
19	enter into, not later than 6 months after the submis-
20	sion of the report under subsection $(a)(2)$ , an agree-
21	ment with the National Research Council and the
22	Institute of Medicine, under which the National Re-
23	search Council and the Institute of Medicine will
24	prepare periodic reports to aid health professionals

1	in preparing for and responding to the adverse
2	health effects of climate change that—
3	(A) review scientific developments on
4	health impacts of climate change; and
5	(B) recommend changes to the national
6	strategic action plan.
7	(2) SUBMISSION.—The agreement under para-
8	graph (1) shall require a report to be submitted to
9	Congress and the Secretary and made publicly avail-
10	able not later than July 1, 2016, and every 4 years
11	thereafter.
12	SEC. 7. DEFINITIONS.
13	In this Act:
14	(1) HEALTH IMPACT ASSESSMENT.—The term
15	"health impact assessment" means a combination of
16	procedures, methods, and tools by which a policy,
17	program, or project may be judged as to its potential
18	effects on the health of a population, and the dis-
19	tribution of those effects within the population.
20	(2) NATIONAL STRATEGIC ACTION PLAN.—The
21	term "national strategic action plan" means the
22	plan issued and revised under section 4.
23	(3) Secretary.—Unless otherwise specified,
24	the term "Secretary" means the Secretary of Health

#### 1 SEC. 8. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

2 (a) IN GENERAL.—There are authorized to be appro3 priated such sums as may be necessary to carry out this
4 Act.

5 (b) APPROPRIATIONS TO HHS.—All funds appro6 priated to carry out this Act shall be appropriated to the
7 Secretary.

8 (c) DISTRIBUTION OF FUNDS BY HHS.—In carrying
9 out this Act, the Secretary may make funds appropriated
10 pursuant to this section available to—

(1) other departments, agencies, and offices ofthe Federal Government;

13 (2) foreign, State, tribal, and local govern-14 ments; and

15 (3) such other entities as the Secretary deter-16 mines appropriate.

17 (d) SUPPLEMENT, NOT REPLACE.—It is the intent
18 of Congress that funds appropriated to carry out this Act
19 should be used to supplement, and not replace, existing
20 sources of funding for public health.
